

How does the school environment meet my child's needs?

Our school is fully accessible throughout.

There is disabled access to all areas of the site, including the new and older buildings.

We have a disabled toilet and changing facilities in the main building and disabled toilets in the Y4 building and in the Y5-6 building.

If a child needs additional equipment or facilities, this is looked at as an individual case and would be fully discussed with parents and carers.

At Swallowfield Primary School, we have a bespoke Curriculum based on what our children need. We consider different learning styles to provide a platform for personalised learning, and giving opportunities for learners to think for themselves, be independent and take responsibility.
